Pastoral Perspective through Lenten Lenses

Considered Georges Seurat's greatest work, A Sunday on La Grande Jatte—1884 is recognized as being one of the most remarkable paintings of the nineteenth century. Of various family excursions throughout the Midwest, viewing this exhibit on display at the Art Institute of Chicago remains for me one of our more memorable visits into the windy city. Stephen Sondheim's musical Sunday in the Park with George (1984) performed on Broadway in New York City will likewise be forever etched in my memory as well.

Curator, Gloria Groom comments on the monumental canvas (measuring approximately ten feet wide) as being among such grand works featuring "complex compositions of modern life whose scale recedes in proportion to the depth of the stage on which they appear." Having been "shown in Impressionist exhibitions" with its impressive "size, ambition, and subjects," this magnificent masterpiece was both "praised by champions of the avant-garde and ridiculed by defenders of the academic tradition." ¹

The descriptive online characterizations published concerning this masterwork appeal to my theatrical, technological, and theological sensibilities as a student of the

arts, theology, engineering and applied science. "With what resembles scientific precision, the artist tackled the issues of color, light, and form. Inspired by research in optical and color theory, he juxtaposed tiny dabs of colors that, through optical blending, form a single and, he believed, more brilliantly luminous hue. To make the experience of the painting even more intense, he surrounded the canvas with a frame of painted dashes and dots, which he, in turn, enclosed with a pure white wood frame, [like] the one with which the painting is exhibited today. The very immobility of the figures and the shadows they cast makes them forever silent and enigmatic. Like all great masterpieces, *La Grande Jatte* continues to fascinate and elude."²

I continually find my own experience of biblical and theological reflection upon the gospel narrative texts in scripture a constantly intriguing mystery through the grand journey of faith, especially during the season of Lent. This year's months of March and April (2022) mark the faithful sojourner's third cycle (Year C of three) in the Lenten liturgy from the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL). The ecclesiastical experiences of scriptural readings throughout these several weeks of ecclesial observances in the liturgical calendar leading up to Holy Week afford the church times of refreshing in our journey with Jesus. May the blessings of this time be made manifest in your hearing and seeing anew the Lord whose grace is greater even among us.
