Pastoral Perspective on Plights and Pilgrimages of Peoples Pictured through Prophetic Passages "Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength." (Isaiah 40:31a)

There is a painting at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City that reminds me of treasured times traveling with my late beloved wife Melissa. We would get away from the fast-paced crowded business surroundings of my previous corporate and collegiate places of work and study a lifetime ago in Manhattan's massive metropolis, going beyond Boston, Massachusetts near where we spent our honeymoon at a bed and breakfast in Chatham on Cape Cod, journeying to Maine's northern New England continental coastline down-east along North America's easternmost U.S. shores beside the majestic North Atlantic.

As a couple of newlywed young urban professional adults, we enjoyed driving by the sea together visiting lighthouses along the coast between Portsmouth and past Portland taking time for sightseeing en route and sampling seafood fare at midday

repast and/or fine evening dining here and there. Even with the ocean's waves dashing upon the jagged deepsea edges of some rocky terrain or through the rhythmic ebb and flow of tidal waters bringing onto beautiful beaches a refreshing reshaping of wet sandy paths for our and others' feet to wistfully wade into over and over again leaving fleeting impressions that would nonetheless stay forever in our vivid reimagined memories, we still also encountered some idyllic bucolic settings graced by stunning sunsets over the expanse across fields of golden straw while strolling with the wind whistling our wants, wishes, and wiles away. The pictured piece referred to earlier here is entitled *Christina's World* (1948) by the artist Andrew Wyeth.

As narrated via MoMA's website app, "Andrew Wyeth's favorite subjects were the land and people around him. He spent his summers in Maine, where he lived near Christina Olson, the woman who inspired this



painting. Christina suffered from a neuromuscular disease and eventually lost the ability to walk."¹ "One day he looked out the window and saw her crawling across a field picking blueberries, and he was inspired to paint the scene he was seeing."² "He really was concentrating on the field to show how lost she feels and how hard it is for her to crawl across the field to her home."³ "And he worked very carefully in the tempera technique to outline each blade of this straw. He even thought of the buildings in the back sort of as an after-thought; he worked on those much later."⁴

"In a 1953 letter to Alfred Barr, the first director of The Museum of Modern Art, Wyeth explained:"⁵ "The challenge to me was to do justice to her extraordinary conquest of a life which most people would consider hopeless. If in some small way I have been able in paint to make the viewer sense that her world may be limited physically but by no means spiritually, then I have achieved what I set out to do."⁶ Our spiritual imagination(s) can be sparked by even the most mundane material matters around us when faced with dire circumstances amidst abjectly adverse and sordid situations. The prophet in Isaiah (30:20-21) remarks, "Although the Lord gives you the bread of adversity and the water of affliction, your teachers will be hidden no more; with your own eyes you will see them. Whether you turn to the right or to the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you, saying, 'This is the way;

*walk in it.*⁷⁷ No matter come what may after summer into fall upon the autumn season of our lives, the Lord is more than able to carry and see us through. Therefore, take heart, dear ones. As Christ has overcome the world, we by the Spirit of Jesus shall overcome.

In the name above all names of the faithful One unto whom we fix our eyes, we persevere
