Pastoral Perspective on Lenten Shores and Beyond

For this season of spring in the week following Easter (2023), a directive excerpt from our sesquicentennial observance by devotional readings through Psalms and Proverbs provides wise guidance through times of refreshing toward contemplative renewal. The Psalter in the 119th Psalm gives us words for prayerful petition and mindful consideration in the 35th verse as rendered in the New International Version:

"Direct me in the path of your commands, for there I find delight." —Psalms 119:35 (NIV)

I remember once traversing by the ocean looking at tidal pools on the coastal terrain that had then been recently populated

by now receding waves. These temporary reservoirs appeared to contain various creatures with different forms of life from the sea naturally captured for brief observation on land. If memory serves, I recall having a sense of leading at the time to explore certain paths and pause at points toward further reflection onsite with renewing insight to bear on increasing awareness of divine direction for the life and times of that transitional season in the journey of faith.

Last month, I was blessed with delightful occasion to gaze upon a piece of museum art that brought the previous pacific memory to mind. The season of Lent for me at times seems to lend itself in thoughtful preparation toward resurrecting life in these latter days awaiting the Lord's renewed anointing presence. Take a gander with me, if you will, through the collective mind's eye accompanied by wonderfully artistic coastal imagination alongside captivating color-filled vistas beside assimilated Atlantic waterways. The following curator notes can serve to assist the viewer in this regard.



This painting dates from the summer of 1909, when the Glackens family vacationed in Wickford, Rhode Island, near Narragansett Bay. Like *Cape Cod Pier*, a radical new work completed the year before, *Wickford Low Tide* is another example of the new direction Glackens was pursuing as he experimented with dazzling color effects and richly encrusted surfaces. The simple composition of *Wickford Low Tide* —composed primarily of horizontal bands that describe a rocky beach, shallow pools of water, sand bars, open water, and then distant sky—afforded the artist the opportunity to experiment with the tactile and chromatic qualities of pigment as he layered thick daubs of paint in the foreground beneath thinner cross-hatched strokes at the top of the canvas.

Even though Glackens had traveled to Wickford, a seaside locale, with his family, he included no figures shown enjoying the view. This is in contrast to an early sketch, in which a small figure of a clam digger or a wading bather appeared in the water close to the horizon line. As Glackens was finding his way with his new style, perhaps his innate exuberance was now directed toward his pigments and the newfound qualities of color and surface that they afforded him, rather than toward a representation of the people who so often had filled his pictures in the past. ¹

May surrealistic seasonal shorelines of Lenten longings lead us anew to deeply delight in the Lord's renewing directions as we continue our journey together in the One who is the resurrection and the life.
