#### Pastoral Perspective on Our Hope in the Lord Jesus Christ

In the context of a recent baptism and upcoming ones prior to this Thanksgiving and Advent, I am having renewed opportune occasion(s) to review and reflect on various theological topics while ministering with youth through the course of conversation(s) involving our congregation's current confirmation class during Sunday school following our weekly morning service(s). As such, I am reminded of the statement *"Hope in the Lord Jesus Christ"* which, over twenty-one years ago, was affirmed by the 214th General Assembly (2002) of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and generally lauded for its clarifying and unifying power. *"Hope in the Lord Jesus Christ"* affirms the Saving Lordship of Jesus Christ in unmistakable declarations:

Jesus Christ is the only Savior and Lord, and all people everywhere are called to place their faith, hope, and love in him. No one is saved by virtue of inherent goodness or admirable living, for "by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God" [Ephesians 2:8]. No one is saved apart from God's gracious redemption in Jesus Christ. Yet we do not presume to limit the sovereign freedom of "God our Savior, who desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" [1 Timothy 2:4]. Thus, we neither restrict the grace of God to those who profess explicit faith in Christ nor assume that all people are saved regardless of faith. Grace, love, and communion belong to God, and are not ours to determine. [lines 155-168]

This statement has received deep appreciation and approval throughout the PCUSA, clearly proclaiming the Lordship of Jesus Christ and the Reformed understanding of salvation. It came to mind again a week ago or so when I was on campus at Princeton with a seminary classmate who presently serves with a Unitarian Universalist congregation in New England. I am looking forward to further scriptural discussion(s) relating to spiritual and/or biblical subjects of interest with younger sojourners in faith among us amid the church's ministry of Word and Sacrament.

To emphasize and reiterate, according to **Hope in the Lord Jesus Christ**, written by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s Office of Theology and Worship,

"No one is saved apart from God's redemption in Jesus Christ. Yet we do not presume to limit the sovereign freedom of God . . .

Thus, we can neither restrict the grace of Jesus Christ to those who profess explicit faith in Christ nor assume that all people are saved regardless of faith. Grace, love and communion belong to God, and are not ours to determine."

W. A. Visser't Hooft wrote, "I don't know whether a Hindu is saved: I only know that salvation comes in Jesus Christ."

This may be unsatisfying for those who wish to leave no question unanswered. Hans Küng and other Catholic theologians have criticized it as being irresponsibly neutral. It is, however, in harmony with the attitude of humility that Jesus commanded in discussions about the reach of salvation. Repeatedly, he cautioned against judging, that is, thinking that we know God's judgments. Jesus' parables and other

statements about the last day are full of surprises and reversals. "Reformed theology has always taught that *salvation is ultimately in God's hands, beyond the pale of human understanding.*" According to **John Calvin**, "We must leave to God alone the knowledge of his church, whose foundation is his secret election."

The admission that we do not know the limits to God's wondrous grace does not lessen the joyous responsibility of Christians to share the good news of Christ with others. To be a Christian is to be claimed by Christ, to know that we are loved by God, and to be called by God to a life of purposeful service. To withhold this knowledge is to be indifferent to the needs of others. As Christians we are entrusted with the biblical story of God's way in the world, and especially with the good news of Jesus. We must tell that good news to others — not because we do not respect them, but because we love them. Many non-Christians may be better, godlier persons than we are; but we are the ones who have been called to share the story. We are to share it humbly, without coercion, trusting the Holy Spirit to use it to touch the hearts of those [with] whom we speak.

From this day forward in faith, along the season of celebration upon our reformation by the reign of Christ, into and through Advent unto the Christ at Christmastide, may we remain continually abiding in the Spirit of the Holy and Anointed One to the glory of the Lord our God alone.
